2023 -2024 Division Budget Recommendation

Secretary Treasurer Leigh presented the 2023/2024 budget for approval.

EICS has prepared an \$82 million operating budget drawing \$375K from operating reserves. Accumulated operating reserves (net of school generated funds) are projected to be \$2.6M at the end of 2023/24 which is 3.2% of operating expenditures.

- Provincial funding is based on projected enrollment of 7,779 students (including 1,600 home education students).
- Budgeted revenue of \$81.3 million includes provincial funding of \$76.9 million.
- Certificated salaries increased 3.75%. Most non-certified salaries increased 3.25%.
- Benefit premiums increased 10.3% overall.
- Projected decrease of 19 Certificated FTE and 6 Non-Certificated FTE.

In the fall, the Budget will be updated for the following items:

- Allocation of the contingency funding set aside for specific student needs
- Anticipated funding adjustment for variance in projected versus actual enrolment on September 29th.
- Funding from application submissions for other provincial priorities like curriculum resources, displaced students, learning disruption and mental health.

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Superintendent's Briefing: Locally Developed Courses

June 14, 2023



Background:

Each year we renew our course offerings. Based on the needs of schools and their response to student interests, we acquire new courses created by other jurisdictions or create our own that are approved by Alberta Education. Once approved, these courses do not require review for three years.

Process:

- 1. As per our Administrative Procedure 218 Locally Approved Courses school leadership works with staff and students to provide recommendations to Central Learning Services for initial approval.
- 2. Any concerns with requests are brought forward and discussed with school leadership to ensure that programming is offered in accordance with Division priorities and strategic planning.
- 3. Alberta Education is contacted to ensure that the courses still meet their requirements and approvals.
- 4. Currently, it is required by Alberta Education to have Board approval for locally developed courses.
